WELCOME to the Annakirche,

the oldest Protestant church in Aachen.

Since 1532 Annakirche was part of the Catholic Benedictine monastery "Sankt Joachim und Anna". In 1748 it was extensively renovated and expanded in the Baroque style by the Aachen master builder Johann Joseph Couven.

It did not become Protestant until 1803, when the French under Napoleon I handed it over to the Protestants of Aachen. After a bombing raid in World War II, the church burned down and was rebuilt in its present form in 1950/51. In 2013 damage to the roof, facade and interior required extensive renovation.

Today, the Protestant Annakirche belongs to the Aachen parish. The community celebrates services here regularly. The church is also very popular for concerts and weddings because of its good acoustics and clear aesthetics.

The simple, light-flooded room offers a place of silence and reflection.



Furnishings of the church interior in the 19th century: The altar and organ are on the same side.



A bread box from 1695/1696, in which the communion bread was kept, a baptismal bowl in Empire style from 1817 and neo-Gothic communion chalices from the Christuskirche, which was permanently destroyed in World War II, belong to the church treasure of the Annakirche.
